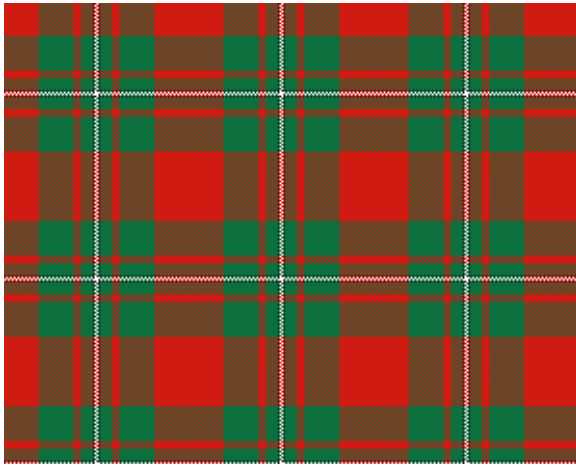
### ***Indiana Highland Games***

A small but friendly event.

## Clan Gregor



The Clan Gregor held lands in Glenstrae, Glenloch, Glenlyon, Glengyle, and Glenorchy. They were descended from the ancient Celtic royal family through the hereditary Abbots of Glendochart, a descent which is proclaimed in the motto, '*S Rioghal Mo Dhream* translated as *Royal is my Race*.

Tradition holds that Gregor was the son of Kenneth MacAlpin; however he may have been Griogair, son of Dungal, who is said to have been a co-ruler of Alba, the kingdom north of Central Scotland, between AD 879 and 889. Most modern historians agree that the first certain Chief was Gregor of the Golden Bridles. Gregor's son, Iain Camm (Ian of the One-Eye) succeeded as the second Chief sometime prior to 1390.

Robert the Bruce granted the barony of Loch Awe, which included much of the MacGregor lands, to the Chief of the Campbells. In common with many royal gifts of the time, it was left to the recipient to work out how he would take possession of it. The Campbells harried the MacGregors who were forced to retire deeper into their lands until they were largely restricted to Glenstrae.

In 1589 John Drummond, the Kings forester, was murdered after hanging some MacGregors for poaching. The Chief, Alasdair MacGregor of Glenstrae, took responsibility for the act and was condemned by the Privy Council. King James VI issued an edict proclaiming the name MacGregor "altogidder abolished," meaning that those who bore the name must renounce it or suffer death.

The Proscriptive Acts of Clan Gregor were enacted on the 3rd of April 1603. This draconian ruling authorized

the capture of Alasdair MacGregor of Glenstrae and his leading kinsmen. In the spring of 1604, Alasdair MacGregor of Glenstrae, Chief and Laird of MacGregor was hung with thirty of his warriors against the West End of Saint Giles Kirk where the Tollbooth stood. Today, the "Heart of Midlothian" in Edinburgh marks the spot where the MacGregor Chief was executed.

The names of Clan Gregor were erased from existence. To even claim one of these names openly was to invite an immediate execution. The clanfolk of the Gregorach were ordered to take different names, usually assigned. They were to obey implicitly the new Chief placed over them. It should be noted here that many of the Gregors refused. Of those who refused (and were caught); the men were executed, the women were stripped bare, branded, and whipped through the streets. The women and children were sold into slavery for Britain's new colonies in North America.

Further additions to the proscriptive acts denied the Gregors basic necessities of food, water, shelter, and care for infants and the elderly. The Gregors were denied the Sacraments of Baptism, Holy Communion, marriage, and last rites. The gentry of Scotland were encouraged to hunt the Gregors with dogs as if they were common game stock. But, without a doubt, the most horrifying act was the commission of selling Gregor heads to the government to attain pardon for thievery and murder.

The surviving MacGregors continued in two groups. The first were those who legally changed their name to satisfy the law, but never changed their heart or blood. The other group were those who took to the great highlands and continued to use their Gregor names in defiance. At Loch Katrine on the 7th of March 1671, the 3rd son of Chieftain Donald (Glas) Gregor of Glengyle and Margaret Campbell, cousin to John Iain (Glas) Campbell 11th Laird of Glenorchy, later in 1681 The Earl of Breadalbane, was born and baptised at Buchanan Parish as Robert MacGregor. Because of the proscription he was forced to assume his mothers name of Campbell. His somewhat fictionalized adventures have been immortalized in Sir Walter Scotts novel, *Rob Roy*.

The persecution of Clan Gregor finally ended in 1774 when the proscription against them was repealed - 171 years later. (Taken from the history of the Clan Gregor, Clan Gregor Society, Edinburgh)

## Kenneth MacAlpin, Scotland's First King

The House of Alpin was founded around 500AD by Fergus, the chief of the Scots of Dalriada. Their capital was at Dunadd and it was here that their kings were proclaimed. Little is known about these early kings as individuals until the 36<sup>th</sup> king, Kenneth MacAlpin.

Kenneth MacAlpin was born between 800-810 AD in Dal Riada, during the Pictish occupation. His father, Alpin, King of Kintyre, had been beheaded fighting for a Pictish king and it is believed that his mother was Queen of the Picts, and that through her (and the matrilineal succession practiced by the Picts) that Kenneth MacAlpin in 845 received the crown of Alba and the title Rex Pictorum.

It was under Kenneth MacAlpin's rule that Scotland was united. Prior to this unification, Scotland had been a country divided with the area known as Dalriada under the control of the Scots (which had originally arrived from Ireland) and the Picts, which were the native inhabitants.

It is said that soon after his succession that MacAlpin held a banquet at Scone and he murdered seven earls of Dalriada who might have opposed his claim to be king of the Scots and the Picts. This murder is popularly known as "MacAlpin's treason."

Once the warfare had ended between Scot and Pict, the job of wise legislation helped seal the union. MacAlpin turned his attention to reforming laws, repressing and punishing crime, as well as improving the administration of justice. He is credited with a code of laws sometimes referred to as "Code MacAlpin". The Code required that every shire in the kingdom have a judge to decide "controversies". It also called for all persons suspected of any crime, to be subjected to an inquest "of seven wise and judicious men", or of any greater odd number of men.

Code MacAlpin established penalties for particular crimes such as hanging for the crime of theft and beheading in the case of murder. Women convicted of these crimes were to be drowned or buried alive. Blaspheming God or speaking disrespectfully of his saints, of his king, or of his chieftains could result in having your tongue cut out. Lying about your neighbor would result in your losing your sword and being shunned by the community. There were also laws to protect agriculture and laws concerning the churches and clergy.

It was Kenneth MacAlpin who moved the Scottish coronation site to Scone in the heart of Pictish land where the Scottish king accepted the crown over the Stone of Destiny, which Scottish legend claims was brought with them from Spain, once rested in Ireland at Tara and thence brought to Scone. Kenneth's first capital was at Dunstaffnage in Argyll but not long after his accession, he moved it to Scone where Moot Hill became the legal center for Scotland. Moving the capital from Dunstaffnage served a twofold purpose, to move the capital from the danger of Viking attack as well as to show MacAlpin's authority by moving the capital to the heart of Pictish land.

Kenneth MacAlpin died of cancer in February 6<sup>th</sup> 858 or 859 (there is some disagreement among authorities) at Forteviot and was buried on Iona. He left his kingdom to his brother Donald, although both of his sons eventually succeeded to the throne. During his reign, Kenneth pushed the boundaries of his kingdom south of the river Forth until it reached as far as the river Tweed. However, the kingdom of Strathclyde, based at Dumbarton, remained untouched.

## **The Second Annual Scottish Highland Games and Festival**

We have just finished the 2nd Annual Indianapolis Scottish Highland Games and Festival and it was a huge success from beginning to end. If you were not able to attend you missed a beautiful and exciting day. The weather was warm, the sky was blue, and all we saw were smiling faces; there were no complaints about anything. The parking and shuttles worked to perfection. Our opening ceremonies involving Mary Queen of Scots, the honored clan, the 25 other clans present, massed pipe bands, our athlete of the day from 2010 and our mascot "The Highland Scotsman" paraded down vendor alley to the Queen's Pavilion. There we conducted a first ever Calling of the Clans with clan representatives announced to the Queen, pledging to defend Scotland, and thrusting ceremonial (wooden) swords into hay bales. Guests enjoyed a marvelous ambiance, including the smell of good food, the sounds of children playing in the Youth Area, and the wafting of live Celtic music. Some enjoyed a sampling of fine Scotch at Tastings held throughout the day. Mayor Ballard made an appearance and spent over an hour at the event. The Mayor was knighted by Mary, Queen of Scots, a first in this manner anywhere in the US. Then he toured the entire event and gave a proclamation that October 8, 2011 was Scottish Heritage Day. He commented numerous times on how much he enjoyed our festival and games and vowed to always support us and be a part of the tradition as much as he can. Kilted athletes threw heavy objects while the crowd cheered. About two dozen vendors displayed Scottish and Celtic goods and an equal number of clan associations proudly displayed their heritage in the Clan Tent area. The day ended with a Ceilidh (Scottish party) in the evening with music by Ken McGee, Isaiah's Cry and Mother Grove. Tom Clayton of Indianapolis won the Beer for a Year drawing and will receive 24 cases of Belhaven Ale, Stout and Lager. The day was amazing and I hope you can attend in the future. Next year we move to German Park for a larger, more open venue. Mark your calendars on October 13, 2012 for the Third Annual Scottish Highland Games and Festival.

## **Coygimwch Dell Patagonia (Prawn Patagonia)**

### Ingredients

570ml (1 pint) Thick Béchamel Sauce  
450g (1lb) Creamed Potatoes  
225g (8oz) Peeled Prawns  
1 Small Cauliflower  
110ml (4fl oz) Double Cream  
110g (4oz) Caerphilly Cheese  
1 tbsp Tomato Ketchup  
1 tsp Garlic Salt  
1 tsp Celery Salt  
1 tsp Ground Bay Leaf  
1 tsp Turmeric  
1 tsp Mustard Powder

### Cooking Directions

Prepare the cauliflower and divide into florets.  
Cook until soft, but still firm.  
Divide and place into eight individual dishes or an oven proof dish.  
Keep warm.  
Combine the cream, tomato ketchup, garlic salt, celery salt, ground bay leaf, turmeric, mustard powder and a little freshly ground pepper.  
Add to Béchamel sauce, mixing thoroughly.  
Add the peeled prawns and the crumbled Caerphilly cheese and heat gently, do not boil.  
Pour the mixture over the cauliflower and grill until golden brown.  
Pipe creamed potatoes around the serving dish.
